Project Audience

Future farmers and beginning farmers (up to 10 years farming experience) with a strong interest in ecologically resilient agriculture.

- Hudson Valley, Northeast, and nationwide
 - Over half of apprentices are from outside the Northeast
 - Young Farmers Conference participants from 30+ states
- Most have no family farming background
- Apprentices: Usually 22 to 33 years old, some college education, at least one year of farming experience






Project Audience

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Overall Target Outcomes (2015 - 2018)

900 beginning farmers trained (conferences, workshops etc.)

- 36 apprentices trained
- 30 new farm business plans
- 600 new Virtual Grange members





Progress (as of Sept. 2015)

580+ conference participants (Young Farmers Conference, Poultry School, 51 workshops for apprentices and other farmers)


6 apprentices graduated, all working on farms 9 apprentices currently in training – at least 3 will launch farm businesses in 2017




